All about the August night sky

<u>From the Almanac</u> – August's first full moon, the **Sturgeon Moon**, reaches its peak the night of Tuesday, August 1. It is called "Sturgeon" because the giant sturgeon fish of the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain were most readily caught during this part of summer. The name comes from a number of peoples, including Native Americans, Colonial Americans, and Europeans. It's also one of the four <u>supermoons</u> of 2023.

More Moons: You'll see another full moon this month. Wednesday, August 30, the once-in-a Blue Moon and, at the same time, largest supermoon of the year – 8 percent larger and

16 percent brighter than a normal full moon; and then the dark-of-the-moon in between, August 16.

Perseid Meteor Shower: August is show time for stargazing. The <u>Perseid meteor shower</u>, one of the most prolific "shooting star" shows, reaches its maximum between August 11 and 13. You can still see the Perseids even if they're not at their peak. The shower lasts from about July 23 to August 22. Look for it especially on the 16th during the new moon -- they are best seen on moonless, cloudless nights.

Attention boaters and road drivers!

Water Patrol is out, especially on weekends, checking for: underage drivers; Safe Boating Course certification cards on the craft; the 100 foot-from-shore rule; life jackets; speed, around buoys in particular; and PVL stickers and/or numbers on all watercraft.

Security has an eye out on lake road protocols: 20 mph everywhere, all vehicles; underage drivers on ATVs and UTVs (Missouri law is 16 years old and up); helmet wear on ATVs and UTVs (required by MO law if under 18 years old); and reckless handling.

The Emergency Warning siren system



The siren located at the maintenance shed near the upper entrance was apparently struck by lightning (witnesses say it was pretty spectacular!). Three Rivers Electric Coop, Chris Bayless (below left) and Randy Fuller (right) worked last week to bring the emergency alert system back up in plenty of time for foul fall weather. They both were in on the original installation 4



or 5 years ago.

Randy said a new system would have cost \$18,000 at the time. So he was able to pull the package

together from two old units donated by the city of Owensville. Three Rivers found a pole for free. Chris Bayless, siren professional maintainer for Owensville, was in on the actual installation. Karl Kloster donated \$3500 for the total cost of installing it.

Thanks to their efforts back then, the lake had robust weather warning on signal from the local Emergency Management Agency weather watchers.

This time the vintage system cannot be resurrected,

even with the 1980s spare parts. Cost for an updated system is prohibitive for now, but people are still working on a solution. In the mean time you can opt in for personal alerts to your cell phone from Gasconade County EMA.

Gardening thoughts

In the Northern Hemisphere, August is the last month of summer and the hottest month of the year. How hot? <u>See August weather outlook</u>.

It is typically harvest time, too. Farmers are uncaracteristically grateful for dry weather so they can get out into fields with heavy equipment. That would especially be true if they got enough rain and cool nights earlier to grow good crops, of course.

Bugs and small critters seem to attack garden plants with more persistence in the fall to prepare for winter. You can keep squirrels and chipmunks away with coffee grounds. Black and red pepper repel many small animals and some bugs (ants). A mix of crushed garlic, water, and dish soap repels Japanese beatles. If it does rain, re-apply.

It is also time for late bloomers like goldenrod, daisies and black-eyed Susans that you may see along byways. They are key butterfly flowers during dry fall days.

One constant is grass throughout the summer, into fall, that might need to be cut – at least before it succumbs to the heat. Botanists say the smell of fresh-cut green grass is actually pheromones plants release when stressed. That said, animals like that smell too – so are equally guilty of reveling in the aroma when the rain falls. If you time it correctly, it's better to leave your grass long for winter – what's above the ground reflects the root system below, meaning good strong roots make happy grass.

Trash again

Please do not use community dumpsters for your personal household daily/weekly trash. You are costing the entire community rather than taking care of yourself.
